### Requirements for Associate in Arts (AA) Degree, Associate in Science (AS) Degree and Illinois Articulation Initiative General Education Core Curriculum (IAI GECC)

The following requirements apply to students who first enrolled for Fall 2011 or later. Students who first entered prior to Fall 2011 should contact an academic advisor for more information. Academic advisors help students choose the appropriate transfer degree and/or recommend the IAI GECC based on transfer requirements.

- Courses shown with an asterisk after the course name are also offered via distance education (online, telecourse or blended).

- Credit hours are shown in parentheses in front of the course number.
- The 38-semester-hour General Education Core Curriculum satisfies IAI GECC requirements. IAI GECC numbers are in bold to the right of the MCC course numbers and titles (e.g., **C1 900**). Courses that share an IAI GECC number may only be used one time each in the general education core. Another course with the same IAI GECC number may be used to fulfill Intercultural Studies, if applicable, or an elective.

MCC's AA and AS degrees require 2 lab sciences. Students who are completing only the IAI GECC and not an AA or an AS degree can use EAS 185 to fulfill a physical science requirement. #### Other AA and AS Graduation Requirements:

- AA degree – foreign language through level 4 (Completion of FRE 252, GER 252, SPA 252, an equivalent course or acceptable CLEP or Advanced Placement score)
- AS degree – 6 credits in mathematics as noted on planning sheet
- Minimum of 60 credit hours
- 2.0 minimum cumulative GPA at MCC on completion of program
- 15 semester hours taken at MCC
- Completion of General Education Assessment exit test
- Completion of Intent to Graduate Form

#### Degree Notes:

- The following pairs of courses have similar course content. Only one course from each pair can be used to satisfy degree requirements: BIO 260 or BIO 263/264; DRT 101 or EGR 151; EAS 120 or EAS 171; EAS 170 or GEL 101; EAS 172 or EAS 180; MAT 120 or MAT 220; MAT 161 or MAT 165; MAT 171 or MAT 175.
- No single course can be used to meet two different requirements.
- Students planning to transfer to a baccalaureate institution need to take specific courses. They should work with an MCC academic advisor and contact their transfer school as soon as possible for review and evaluation of their MCC credits.
- Acceptance of a D grade and non-traditional credit (CLEP, AP, DANTEs, military service, proficiency exam) varies from institution to institution.
