

## Requirements for Associate in Fine Arts (AFA) Degree

### Music Option

The AFA degree is designed to allow for the completion of a significant number of lower-division courses of a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree. BFA programs are highly structured and require many sequential courses in the major field at the lower-division level. As a result, the AFA degree does not include the entire IAI General Education Core Curriculum. This means that students who complete the AFA degree must complete the general education requirements for the bachelor's degree of the university to which they transfer. **It is important to work closely with an MCC advisor and your transfer school.**

The following requirements apply to students who first enrolled for Fall 2009 or later. Students who first enrolled prior to Fall 2009 should contact an advisor for more information.

- No single course can be used to meet 2 different requirements.
- Students who are interested in majoring in music should contact an advisor before selecting a transfer degree program.
- Contact your transfer school as soon as possible for evaluation of your MCC credits. Some 4-year schools require auditions or placement testing for transfer of major-related courses and for admission and to the Music program. Competency in a foreign language may also be required.
- Acceptance of non-traditional credit (CLEP, AP, DANTES, military service, proficiency exam) varies from institution to institution.)
- Students must apply for graduation and pay the graduation fee at the beginning of their last semester in the Registration Office. An official degree audit will follow.
